

Dear Youth Safety In-Service Attendees,

I am pleased to announce the 2010 Youth Safety In-Service, formerly the Alaska D.A.R.E. Officers In-Service, Training Conference, which will be held at the Clarion Suites in Anchorage on February 24 through February 26. This year's conference is a bit different as we are opening the conference up to attendees who are interested in Youth Safety.

The agenda includes National speakers, Josh Brown "CPTED – Community Policing Through Environmental Design", Sgt. Michael McHenry and Deputy Lance Christiansen "Drug Update", and Phil Chalmers "Inside the Mind of the Teen Killer". The agenda also includes Local speakers, Sgt. Kathy Lacey and SA Jolene Goeden "Human Trafficking" and Lori Grassgreen "Relationship Violence" (The following pages provide an introduction of these speakers).

We will also have a half-day workshop covering the new Middle School Curriculum "keeping it REAL" and enhancement lessons on February 24. This special workshop is designed for those D.A.R.E. Officers who have not received their certification on the new Middle School Curriculum or enhancement lessons. There will also be a DOT Educational Block refresher.

Following the success of last year, we are offering the opportunity for D.A.R.E. Officers who have not taught within the last two years and/or have allowed their certification to lapse, to recertify during the Youth Safety In-Service. Please contact the D.A.R.E. office for further information and to sign up for recertification.

As with previous years, we will be kicking off the Training Conference with a reception, at the FOAST Museum on February 24 at 5:30pm. Each year we have raffles at the reception, raffling off items from our vendors and other donations. FOAST is located at 245 West 5th Avenue, Anchorage, Alaska (underneath the 5th Avenue parking garage).

**D.A.R.E. Officers Only:** D.A.R.E. Alaska will provide a limited number of rooms for the nights of the 24<sup>th</sup> - 26<sup>th</sup> for those officers from out of town (double occupancy) who register by **February 12**. Hotel reservations for D.A.R.E. Officers are made using the registration form. Do not contact the hotel directly unless you wish to pay for your room yourself, if so please contact this office for a group number. The group room rate is **\$99/night** plus tax. The hotel has agreed to extend the group rate for 3 days prior to and following the conference. Individual officers will be responsible for any extra days before or after the conference. Room rates are guaranteed for reservations made prior to February 12 only. After February 12, the group rate will be on space available basis. D.A.R.E. will provide per diem for officers staying at the hotel on the D.A.R.E. registration lists. Travel to and from the conference is the responsibility of the officer and his/her department. ## Sex Trafficking in Alaska

This presentation will focus on the issues of human trafficking and sex trafficking in Alaska. The Anchorage Police Department Vice Unit and FBI have partnered to address the sex trafficking of young girls and women in Alaska. Attendees will learn about the different types of sex trafficking that occur in Alaska and how to identify children that might be at risk or involved. They will also learn about the cycle of violence and manipulation that many of these young girls experience at the hands of the men who exploit them (pimps and johns). Case examples will be used to better illustrate the experiences of these victims.

### The speakers

**Sergeant Kathy Lacey**, a life-long Alaskan, began her law enforcement career with the Anchorage Police Department in 1993. She is currently Sergeant of the Vice Unit in the Detective Division of APD. She also has served as Sergeant of APD's Special Victims Unit, Burglary Unit, and Special Assignment Unit.

Sgt. Lacey has spent the majority of her career at APD working drug and prostitution related crimes. She now heads a human trafficking task force called Alaska Coalition on Trafficking (ACT) in Anchorage. This task force is a multi-disciplinary group aimed at identifying and prosecuting traffickers as well as restoring trafficking victims.

Sgt. Lacey and the APD Vice Unit are currently investigating numerous human trafficking cases in collaboration with the FBI, ICE and the US Attorney's Office. Recently the APD Vice Unit joined with the FBI and U.S. Attorneys' Office to form an Innocence Lost Task Force. This is an investigative task force to identify juveniles involved in prostitution and prosecute the traffickers.

Sgt. Lacey holds a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice with a Specialization in Human Services and is currently working on a Master's Degree.

**SA Jolene Goeden** has been with the FBI since March 2004. She has been assigned to the Anchorage Division and works primarily human trafficking and sex trafficking cases. SA Goeden works closely with Sgt. Lacey and the Vice Unit to address human trafficking matters. SA Goeden helped to establish the Innocence Lost Task Force, which is a collaboration between the FBI and Anchorage Police Department to address sex trafficking of juveniles in Anchorage. The mission of the task force is to rescue children who are being exploited through prostitution and sex trafficking and prosecute the offenders who are responsible.

SA Goeden is also involved in the Alaska Coalition on Trafficking (ACT). This task force is a multi-disciplinary group aimed at identifying and prosecuting traffickers as well as restoring trafficking victims. This task force has proven to be a very successful collaboration between law enforcement and social service providers.

SA Goeden holds a Master's Degree in Forensic Psychology from John Jay College in New York, New York. Prior to working for the FBI, SA Goeden worked for approximately 8 years with sex offenders in prison based and psychiatric hospital settings in Philadelphia and Minneapolis.

## **2009-2010 At Risk Social Trends & Current Drug Trends**

This presentation is a current overview of the most recent trends in drug use, at risk social groups, fight clubs, emerging gangs, and issues of electronic devices use on the school campus.

### **Overview:**

This presentation is a three part workshop with over 200 pieces of drug paraphernalia and concealment devices. Video presentation demonstrates drug induced symptomology. Extensive reference links to street drug names and terminology on line; Followed by multi-media artwork created by students that depicts at risk social trends in today's school; Use of electronic devices on the school campus. This presentation was recently taught at the National Association of School Resource Officers during August of 2008 and July of 2009. Additional presentations include National School Safety Advocacy Council Annual conference August 2009.

### **Area of Topic: Current Drug Trends**

The concealment devices and drug paraphernalia shown were collected during a three month period from our high school campuses. The collected items came directly from our students. Included in this presentation is new drug paraphernalia technology being sold and marketed to our kids. "This is an eye opener for anyone working with in the schools". "This is an outstanding training resource for any administrator or law enforcement officer". The NASRO attendee's will be able to handle the items and shown how they are used in today's schools, "Tool of the trade". This presentation was recently televised on KOCE and presented at the California State SRO Conference in Aug of 2008.

### **Area of Topic: At Risk Social Trends**

A collection of poster's and short video clips were created by our students discussing the at risk social groups on today's school campus. Discussed social groups include, "Emo, Scene, Goth, Punk, Bro & Ho, Flat Biller, Straight Edge, Fresh, and Indie." The influence of MMA (*Mix Martial Arts*) is prevalent within our schools. This topic covers a few of our active fight clubs that have crossed the nation due to various media sources. "Tap-out", "No Limits", "Ultimate fighter" "Ballers" etc... This presentation has actual display items from the clothing manufactures that these groups wear as badges, including video of fights showing the training methods of these groups. This presentation will assist attendees with the identification of active groups on your campus with solutions on how to combat them.

### **Area of topic: Electronic Devices**

This topic will assist attendees in recognition of electronic device issues such as, "Sexting", Concealed USB drives, use of electronic means for cheating, key loggers for cyber attacks, pay / owe sheets (*written drug sales ledger*), text messages, cheating, and media clips of unlawful activity.
